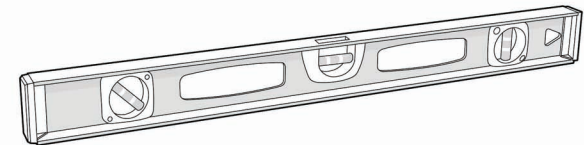


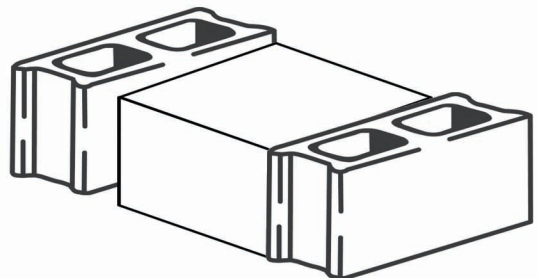
## RECOMMENDATIONS



Shooting areas for fireworks should be level asphalt, concrete, or a flat hard-packed dirt surface. If shot from grass or other uneven surfaces, fireworks could tip over and serious injuries could result

Shooting areas for fireworks should be clear of any combustible brush, grass, or leaves

Stabilize fireworks “cakes” and tubes with bricks or cement blocks

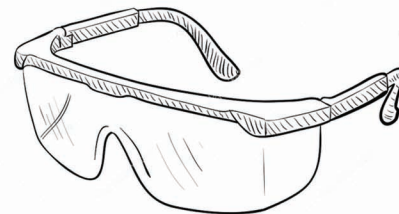


## RECOMMENDATIONS



Use a flashlight to locate fireworks and fuses in the dark

Use eye protection when lighting aerial fireworks



.....Finally, remember to clean up your shooting area after your display, douse your shot off fireworks thoroughly with water and dispose of them properly



## ★GLOSSARY★

**CAKES** - Devices containing multiple heavy paper or cardboard tubes that fire in a sequence upon ignition, shooting balls of composition (stars) or projectiles (shells or shots) into the air that burst with visible and audible effects



**CHASERS** - Paper or cardboard tubes that, upon ignition, travel along the ground with a whistle or other noise



**FIRECRACKERS** - Small paper-wrapped or cardboard tubes containing explosive composition intended to produce a bang



**HELICOPTERS** - Propeller or blade items that spin rapidly and rise into the air, sometimes with an effect

## ★GLOSSARY★



**MISSILES** - Similar to rockets, but use fins rather than a stick for guidance and stability



**RELOADABLE SHELLS** - Prepackaged kits containing a launching tube and individually fired small aerial shells that upon loading and ignition, shoot into the air and burst with visible and audible effects



**ROCKETS** - Cylindrical tubes attached to a wooden stability stick that when shot from a pipe or trough, rise into the air upon ignition and produce a burst of color and/or sound

**ROMAN CANDLES** - Heavy paper or cardboard tubes that upon ignition expel multiple balls of composition or effects into the air

★ THE NEW PENNSYLVANIA LAW ★  
AS OF OCTOBER 2017



You can buy, possess and use fireworks if you are at least 18 years old

You can only use fireworks labeled as Consumer Fireworks UN0336 1.4g





You can only use fireworks outdoors

You can only use fireworks where you have permission of the property owner



★ THE NEW PENNSYLVANIA LAW ★  
AS OF OCTOBER 2017



You cannot shoot fireworks at cars or motor vehicles



You cannot shoot fireworks at homes or buildings



You cannot shoot fireworks at another person



You cannot use fireworks while under the influence of alcohol

★ THE NEW PENNSYLVANIA LAW ★  
AS OF OCTOBER 2017



You cannot use fireworks while under the influence of a controlled substance or illegal drug



You must be at least 150 feet (50 yards) away from any home or business to set off fireworks



Using fireworks in violation of the law is a summary offense and subject to a fine of up to \$100

RECOMMENDATIONS



Always read and follow all warnings and instructions on the labels of your fireworks



Do not ignite fireworks while holding them

Do not shoot fireworks at animals





Do not shoot fireworks at unreasonable hours, respect your neighbors

RECOMMENDATIONS

Do not store fireworks in your home or car





Keep a bucket of water, fire extinguisher or a garden hose handy to water down your shooting area or in the case of an unwanted fire

Keep fireworks out of the hands of children



Keep fireworks in their original packing until you are ready to use them


RECOMMENDATIONS

Keep other fireworks at a safe distance from your shooting area when lighting





If your firework fizzes and doesn't go off, consider it a dud and don't try to relight it. Instead, douse it with water, dispose of it properly, and notify your supplier



Never position any part of your body over fireworks when lighting them

Never take apart or try to modify fireworks
