# MINUTES OF MEETING MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OCTOBER 28, 2013

Chairman Joseph Walsh called the executive session to order at 7:00 p.m. In attendance were Supervisors Robert Birch, Candyce Fluehr Chimera, Michael Fox and Jeffrey McDonnell. Also in attendance were Lawrence Gregan, Robert Iannozzi, Esquire, and Bruce Shoupe.

Chairman Joseph Walsh called the action meeting to order at 8:05 p.m. In attendance were Supervisors Robert Birch, Candyce Fluehr Chimera, Michael Fox and Jeffrey McDonnell. Also in attendance were Robert Iannozzi, Esquire, Lawrence Gregan, Chief J. Scott Bendig, Richard Lesniak, Shannon Drosnock, Ann Shade, Kevin Costello, Bruce Shoupe, Stacy Crandell, Richard Grier and Deb Rivas.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Chairman Joseph Walsh called for public comment from the audience.

Under public comment, residents Adele Herman and Ralph Schurr, who live off of North Wales Road next to Montgomery Mall, expressed their concerns regarding ongoing traffic congestion on North Wales Road. Of particular concern was the fact that traffic has been very bad and the new Wegmans store has not even opened their doors. They stated that the Board had said that they were going to do something about the traffic issues and that it has been a year since the Wegmans was approved and the 202 Parkway was opened and nothing has improved. Township Manager Lawrence Gregan reported that improvements are scheduled to be done at three intersections surrounding that particular area. Supervisor Candyce Chimera stated that the Board has pushed Montgomery Mall to make improvements to the surrounding roads and traffic signals. Supervisor Michael Fox stated that the Board has tried to do what is in the best interest of the Township and that improvements are not completed yet. The Board will continue to address traffic problems and if something does not work, we will try something else. Chairman Joseph Walsh stated that the Board worked with the Mall to create the buffer on

North Wales Road and a study was done to see if it was possible to have an access road connect from the 202 Parkway directly to the Mall. Resident Bob McMahon stated that it is a bad time of year for traffic in this area. With the opening of the Wegmans store and the holiday season approaching, traffic in the area of North Wales Road will be horrendous. Mr. McMahon asked if there was a temporary solution that could be done until the intersection improvements were made. Police Chief Bendig and Director of Public Works Kevin Costello said that they will work together to see what can be done to temporarily ease the traffic situation in that area.

Township Solicitor Robert Iannozzi, Esquire reported that the Board met in an executive session earlier in the evening at 7:00 p.m. Mr. Iannozzi reported that the Board discussed the zoning matter of R.D. Management and a matter of potential litigation. Mr. Iannozzi also reported that these matters are legitimate subjects of executive session pursuant to Pennsylvania's Sunshine Law.

Chairman Joseph Walsh made a motion to approve the minutes of the October 15, 2013 Board meeting, and Supervisor Michael Fox seconded the motion. The minutes of the meeting were unanimously approved as submitted.

Chairman Joseph Walsh announced that the Wolf Den Pack 547, based at Mary Mother of the Redeemer school, participated in a tour of the Township building this evening and are also taking part in the public meeting. The Wolf Cubs are required to visit a government building as part of their achievements towards rank advancement. Members of the pack who attended the meeting were: Jeremy Banks, William Bernal, Ryan Caspar, Luke Drelick, Zachary Duhl, Anthony Kremzukou, Michael Lagrutta, Connor Thomson and Evan Wescoe. Resolution #1 made by Supervisor Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, recognized Wolf Den Pack 547 for their interest in taking an active role in learning more about the Township and how they can become further involved residents.



Assistant to the Township Manager Stacy Crandell announced the upcoming Fall Curbside Leaf Waste Collection date. The Township has contracted with Republic Services, Inc. to provide curbside leaf and yard waste collections twice a year in the Fall and the Spring from residential properties in the Township. The Fall 2013 curbside leaf and yard waste collection is scheduled for Saturday, November 16, 2013. Residents are reminded to place the materials in biodegradable paper bags at the curb prior to 7:00 a.m. that day or put them out the night before.

Chairman Joseph Walsh announced that vacancies currently exist on the Montgomery Township Industrial Development Authority and the Zoning Hearing Board. Residents Edward Diasio and Dan Baker have expressed an interest in serving on these boards. Mr. Diasio has been serving as a member of the Board of Auditors and has resigned from that position.

Resolution #2 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted unanimously, accepted the resignation of Edward Diasio from his position as Elected Township Auditor and approved his appointment to serve as an "Alternate" on the Zoning Hearing Board for a term to expire on January 1, 2014. Resolution #2 also appointed Dan Baker to the Montgomery Township Industrial Development Authority for a term to expire on January 1, 2015.

Chairman Joseph Walsh opened the Public Hearing at 8:30 p.m. for the consideration of a change in zoning request by Terra Vista, LLC, for the Billboard Limited Industrial Overlay District Extension, proposed Ordinance #13-274-Z. Notes of testimony were taken by Court Reporter, Tim Kurek. Attorney David Onorato, representing the applicant, requested that the Limited Industrial Billboard Overlay District be approved for the southbound side of Bethlehem Pike starting at approximately 420 feet south of the centerline of Stump Road for a distance of 990 feet with a depth of 150 feet from the centerline of Bethlehem Pike. Mr. Onorato stated that there would be only one billboard located in the requested extension area. Under public

comment, Loren Szczesny, Esquire, an attorney representing CBS stated that he recently attended a staff meeting at the Township to discuss his client's interest in placing a billboard on the property across from this proposed location. Mr. Szczesny said that he wanted to advise the Board that his client will be making a similar request to extend the billboard overlay district across the street on Bethlehem Pike. The hearing closed at 8:50 p.m. Resolution #3 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Robert Birch and adopted unanimously, approved Ordinance #13-274-Z – Billboard Limited Industrial Overlay District Extension.

Chairman Joseph Walsh stated that attorney Robert Brandt, Esquire currently serves as special counsel to the Township in two Eminent Domain proceedings relating to the Township's acquisition of the Zehr Tract. Mr. Brandt has advised that he has been requested to represent Somerville Montgomery, LP, in connection with an application for Zoning Relief associated with an application for conversion of the Signature Furniture store at 640 Cowpath Road to a BJ's Wholesale Club. Mr. Brandt has submitted a request to the Board asking for a waiver of any conflict so that he can proceed to represent Somerville Montgomery, LP on this project in the Township. Resolution #4 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, approved the waiver of any conflict of interest for Robert Brandt, Esquire, to represent Somerville Montgomery, LP in connection with any applications for conversion of the Signature Furniture store at 640 Cowpath Road to a BJ's Wholesale Club.

Resolution #5 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Robert Birch and adopted unanimously, authorized a construction escrow release #3 for Keystone Homebrew LDS#657 in the amount of \$225,397.30.

Director of Finance Shannon Drosnock reported that the Minimum Municipal Obligation calculation has determined that for 2014, a combination of State Aid, Township contributions and Police Officer contributions will be required to meet the funding obligations of the Plan and keep the pension fund actuarially sound. Resolution #6 made by Supervisor Michael Fox,



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seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, requires Police Officer contributions to the Police Pension Plan in the amount of 5% of Base Salary, Longevity and Holiday pay for the year 2014 and direct that notice of contribution be provided to the representatives of the Police Collective Bargaining Unit.

Director of Finance Shannon Drosnock reported that two major capital expenditures approved in the 2013 budget will not be incurred during fiscal year 2013; the replacement of Engine 18-1 in the Fire Department (\$450,000) and the replacement of an ERP software system in the Finance Department (\$200,000). These expenditures were presented to the Board for consideration in the fiscal year 2014 budget. Mrs. Drosnock stated that it would be appropriate to amend the 2013 budget and remove these expenditures given the significant dollar amount. Resolution #7 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Robert Birch and adopted unanimously, approved the 2013 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter Budget Amendments to the General Fund, the Fire Services Fund and the Capital Reserve Fund.

Director of Finance Shannon Drosnock reported that the Finance Department periodically reviews the Codes of the Township that pertain to revenues and expenditures and recommends amendments to improve or clarify the current language. As a result of this review, staff has identified amendments to be made to Chapters 205 and A237 of the Township Code in an effort to make the language clearer and more consistent with current practices. The proposed amendments include reducing the number of districts from five to three, clarifying the descriptions of the three districts, and removing redundant and outdated language. Resolution #8 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, authorized the advertisement of proposed Ordinance #13-276 which will amend Chapters 205 and A237 of the Montgomery Township Code governing street lighting.

Director of Fire Services Rick Lesniak reported that the Department of Homeland Security offers a number of grant opportunities. The Department of Fire Services submitted an

application under the Fire Prevention and Safety Activity category to provide and install traditional smoke alarms, units with voice notification for children and strobe/bed-shaker alarm kits will be made available to the deaf, hard of hearing and deaf-blind communities. The Township is required to contribute 10% or \$8,520.00 for the grant to be accepted. Resolution #9 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, authorized the Department of Fire Services to accept the FY2012 Fire Prevention and Safety (FP&S) Grant from the Department of Homeland Security in the amount of \$85,200.

Chairman Joseph Walsh reported that the Township has received a request for a waiver of a permit fee for a Special Event for the Bharatiya Temple Diwali Festival. Chairman Walsh stated that is has been the policy of the Board of Supervisors to waive permit fees for non-profit and religious organizations. Chairman Walsh inquired if there were any concerns about the special event and the use of fireworks. Mr. Lesniak indicated that he had meet with representatives of the Bharatiya Temple and that he was comfortable with the event's use of sparklers as was described to him. Resolution #10 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Michael Fox and adopted unanimously, approved the waiver of a permit fee for a special event for the Bharatiya Temple.

Director of Public Works Kevin Costello reported that in the past the Township has participated in the Montgomery County Consortium Cooperative Rock Salt Purchase Contract as it has been determined to be the most cost effective way to purchase bulk salt for deicing roadways during the winter months. The Consortium recently completed the bidding process for the purchase of bulk salt for 2013-2014 and has awarded the contract to International Salt Company. Montgomery Township would like to participate in this year's bid. Resolution #11 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Michael Fox and adopted unanimously, approved the Township's participation in the Montgomery County Consortium





Cooperative Rock Salt Purchase Contract for 2013-2014 for the purchase of rock salt from International Salt Company, LLC of Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania, at a price of \$51.43 per ton.

Supervisor Michael Fox made a motion to approve the payment of bills. Supervisor Candyce Chimera seconded the motion. The payment of bills was unanimously approved as submitted.

Under other business, Chairman Joseph Walsh made a motion, #12, to authorize the Township Solicitor to oppose the Zoning Hearing Board application for a home occupation at 102 Carson Drive and to enter an appearance to defend the Township's position. Vice-Chairman Jeffrey McDonnell seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

#### BACKGROUND:

A request was recently submitted by a resident of the Montgomery Oaks development inquiring about the possibility of the Township installing a sidewalk across the frontage of PECO's Powerline right of way property on Hartman Road, between the Montgomery Oaks and Montgomery Walk Developments. Currently an unimproved path exists at this location and is used by walkers, bicyclists and runners to cross between the neighborhoods. Due to the unimproved surface of this path, many are forced to walk in the Hartman Road cartway, which is a heavily traveled state highway with a 45MPH speed limit.

The developer for the Montgomery Walk project, is required to install an asphalt trail through the PECO Powerline property and this work is scheduled to be completed in the Spring 2014. Upon completion of that trail, walkers, bicycle riders and runners will be able to travel from Hartman Road to the township border line with Horsham Township and through the Montgomery Walk development to our new Friendship Park currently under construction on Enclave Boulevard. This park will have a loop walkway around the perimeter of the park which will result in a lengthy and safe trail for use by residents from the Township to travel around these neighborhoods.

Constructing the sidewalk across the PECO Powerline right of way is a natural expansion to that trail project and consistent with the Township's goal of improving the walkability in the Township.

Public Works Director Kevin Costello reviewed the site and based on our sidewalk contract with Drumheller Contractors, the cost to install a new 5' wide by 230 l.f. by 4" thick concrete sidewalk across the frontage of the PECO Right of Way would be approximately \$13,800.00. Drumheller's bid this year was very favorable with very low unit prices. Proceeding now will allow us to take advantage of the favorable rates and save money. Drumheller is currently wrapping up work on our annual curb/sidewalk replacement project and if the Board authorizes moving forward on the project could, weather permitting, be able to perform the installation within the next two weeks.





BACKGROUND: On August 26, 2013, the Board approved the design of the HVAC system for the Recreation/Community Center using a ground source (Geothermal) water loop heat pump system. The approval was conditioned upon the Architect proceeding with drilling a test well to determine the depth and formation thermal conductivity of the groundwater and its ability to support this environmentally friendly HVAC system.

The Board's approval was further conditioned that if the test well indicated that additional wells (beyond 40) were needed or if the required well depth exceeded 450', both of which would significantly increase the cost, the Board would have to revisit this matter.

Since that time, the test well has been drilled and the ground water has been tested on two different occasions to determine its suitability for a ground source (Geothermal) water loop heat pump system. A copy of the last test results and letter of recommendation from the project architect is attached.

ZONING, SUBDIVISION OR LAND DEVELOPMENT IMPACT: None.

BUDGET IMPACT: The estimated cost for the ground source (Geothermal) water loop heat pump system was approximately \$350 K higher than a natural gas system but uses approximately 50% of the energy.

RECOMMENDATION: Consider the results of the testing and determine whether or not to proceed with the design and use of a ground source (Geothermal) water loop heat pump system as the HVAC system for the Recreation/Community Center.

RE: Geothermal System at the new Montgomery Township Community Center

Larry,

As per the request of the Steering Committee the following is an outline of the process undertaken to confirm the viability of using a geothermal HVAC system for heating and cooling at the Community Center.

- At the BOS meeting on August 26, 2013 KBA presented the pros and cons of a conventional HVAC system vs. a geothermal HVAC system. Even though the geothermal system was projected to add approximately \$350,000 to the project budget and the payback was over 30 years verses a conventional system the BOS elected to move forward with an evaluation of the geothermal system based on the fact that it would be "green" and use 40% less energy.
- KBA contracted with a well driller to install a 450' deep test well and perform a conductivity test in order to obtain information on the ground's ability to accept and reject heat from the HVAC system. This information is critical to have in order to accurately design the geothermal HVAC system.

- The conductivity test was performed on October 8 10, 2013 and the results indicated a fluctuation in loop temperature and a large variation in ground water levels (possibly due to the nearby quarry) providing data that could not be used in calculating the conductivity of the earth.
- A second test was performed on October 28 30, 2013. Similar results were obtained but there was sufficient information to calculate the ground conductivity at 1.10 Btu/hr-ft-F. This reading is considered to be on the low side of an acceptable range for the performance of the system.
- Based on the anticipated building loads and an assumed conductivity
  of the ground the mechanical engineer originally estimated 40
  geothermal bores would be required for the project. Utilizing the
  actual test data indicating the low conductivity the Engineer has
  determined that the geothermal system would need an additional 9 to
  16 bores (depending on layout and depth) to meet the building HVAC
  loads. We estimate that the additional bores would add approximately
  \$100,000 to \$150,000 dollars to the project cost.
- Therefore, based on the added cost and the possibility that the system may not perform as designed due to the fluctuating ground water levels, Kimmel Bogrette and McHugh Engineers recommend that the Township NOT pursue a geothermal HVAC system for the building. A conventional natural gas system is recommended.

#### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A formation thermal conductivity test was performed at the Montgomery Township Community Recreation Center site at 1030 Stump Road, Montgomeryville, Pennsylvania. The vertical bore was completed on September 27, 2013 by Allied Well Drilling. Geothermal Resource Technologies' (GRTI) test unit was attached to the vertical bore on the afternoon of October 8, 2013.

This report provides an overview of the test procedures and analysis process, along with plots of the loop temperature and input heat rate data. Some variation in the loop temperature data occurred during the test, possibly due to groundwater movement in the formation resulting from a nearby well pump in operation. A second test performed October 28-30 showed similar loop temperature variation. An additional test on a production bore should be considered to verify these results. The collected data was analyzed using the "line source" method and the following average formation thermal conductivity was determined.

#### Formation Thermal Conductivity = 1.10 Btu/hr-ft-°F

Due to the necessity of a thermal diffusivity value in the design calculation process, an estimate of the average thermal diffusivity was made for the encountered formation.

## Formation Thermal Diffusivity $\approx 0.86 \text{ ft}^2/\text{day}$

The undisturbed formation temperature for the tested bore was established from the initial loop temperature data collected at startup.

#### **Undisturbed Formation Temperature** ≈ 54.9-56.7°F

The formation thermal properties determined by this test do not directly translate into a loop length requirement (i.e. feet of bore per ton). These parameters, along with many others, are inputs to commercially available loop-field design software to determine the required loop length. Additional questions concerning the use of these results are discussed in the frequently asked question (FAQ) section at <a href="https://www.grti.com">www.grti.com</a>.

#### TEST PROCEDURES

The American Society of Heating, Refrigeration, and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) has published recommended procedures for performing formation thermal conductivity tests in the ASHRAE HVAC Applications Handbook, Geothermal Energy Chapter. The International Ground Source Heat Pump Association (IGSHPA) also lists test procedures in their Design and Installation Standards. GRTI's test procedures meet or exceed those recommended by ASHRAE and IGSHPA, with the specific procedures described below:

**Grouting Procedure for Test Loops** – To ensure against bridging and voids, it is recommended that the bore annulus is uniformly grouted from the bottom to the top via tremie pipe.

**Time Between Loop Installation and Testing** – A minimum delay of five days between loop installation and test startup is recommended for bores that are air drilled, and a minimum waiting period of two days for mud rotary drilling.

**Undisturbed Formation Temperature Measurement** – The undisturbed formation temperature should be determined by recording the loop temperature as the water returns from the u-bend at test startup.

**Required Test Duration** – A minimum test duration of 36 hours is recommended, with a preference toward 48 hours.

Data Acquisition Frequency - Test data is recorded at five minute intervals.

Equipment Calibration/Accuracy – Transducers and datalogger are calibrated per manufacturer recommendations. Manufacturer stated accuracy of power transducers is less than  $\pm 2\%$ . Temperature sensor accuracy is periodically checked via ice water bath.

**Power Quality** – The standard deviation of the power should be less than or equal to 1.5% of the average power, with maximum power variation of less than or equal to 10% of the average power.

**Input Heat Rate** – The heat flux rate should be 51 Btu/hr (15 W) to 85 Btu/hr (25 W) per foot of installed bore depth to best simulate the expected peak loads on the u-bend.

**Insulation –** GRTI's equipment has 1 inch of foam insulation on the FTC unit and 1/2 inch of insulation on the hose kit connection. An additional 2 inches of insulation is provided for both the FTC unit and loop connections by insulating blankets.

**Retesting in the Event of Failure** – In the event that a test fails prematurely, a retest may not be performed until the bore temperature is within 0.5°F of the original undisturbed formation temperature or until a period of 14 days has elapsed.

#### DATA ANALYSIS

Geothermal Resource Technologies, Inc. (GRTI) uses the "line source" method of data analysis to determine the thermal conductivity of the formation. The line source method assumes an infinitely thin line source of heat in a continuous medium. A plot of the late-time temperature rise of the line source temperature versus the natural log of elapsed time will follow a linear trend. The linear slope is inversely proportional to the thermal conductivity of the medium. If a u-bend grouted in a borehole is used to inject heat into the ground at a constant rate in order to determine the average formation thermal conductivity, the test must be run long enough to allow the finite dimensions of the u-bend pipes and the grout to become insignificant. Experience has shown that approximately ten hours is required to allow the error of early test times and the effects of finite borehole dimensions to become insignificant.

In order to analyze real data from a formation thermal conductivity test, the average temperature of the water entering and exiting the u-bend heat exchanger is plotted versus the natural log of elapsed testing time. Using the Method of Least Squares, linear equation coefficients to produce a line that fits the data are calculated. This procedure is normally repeated for various time intervals to ensure that variations in the power or other effects are not producing inaccurate results.

The calculated results are based on test bore information submitted by the driller/testing agency. GRTI is not responsible for inaccuracies in the results due to erroneous bore information. All data analysis is performed by personnel that have an engineering degree from an accredited university with a background in heat transfer and experience with line source theory. The test results apply specifically to the tested bore. Additional bores at the site may have significantly different results depending upon variations in geology and hydrology.

Through the analysis process, the collected raw data is converted to spreadsheet format (Microsoft Excel®) for final analysis. If desired, please contact GRTI and a copy of the data will be made available in either a hard copy or electronic format.




FIG. 1: TEMPERATURE & HEAT RATE DATA VS TIME, OCTOBER 8-10




FIG. 2: TEMPERATURE & HEAT RATE DATA VS TIME, OCTOBER 28-30

Figures 1 and 2 show the loop temperature and heat input rate data versus the elapsed time for each test. The temperature of the fluid supplied to and returning from the U-bend are plotted on the left axis, while the amount of heat supplied to the fluid is plotted on the right axis on a per foot of bore basis. In the test statistics below, calculations on the power data were performed over the analysis time period listed in the Line Source Data Analysis section.




FIG. 3: TEMPERATURE & HEAT RATE VS NATURAL LOG OF TIME

The loop temperature and input heat rate data versus the natural log of elapsed time are shown above in Figure 3 for the October 8-10 test. The temperature versus time data was analyzed using the line source method (see page 3) in conformity with ASHRAE and IGSHPA guidelines. A linear curve fit was applied to the average of the supply and return loop temperature data between 14 and 47.6 hr. The slope of the curve fit was found to be 5.44. The resulting thermal conductivity was found to be 1.10 Btu/hr-ft-°F. Some variation in the loop temperature data occurred during the test, possibly due to groundwater movement in the formation resulting from a nearby well pump in operation. A second test was performed on October 28-30, shown in Figure 2 on page 5. The data displayed a similar pattern of loop temperature variation. An additional test on a production bore should be considered to verify the results.

#### THERMAL DIFFUSIVITY

The reported drilling log for this test borehole indicated that the formation consisted of shale. A heat capacity value for shale was calculated from specific heat and density values listed by Kavanaugh and Rafferty (Ground-Source Heat Pumps - Design of Geothermal Systems for Commercial and Institutional Buildings, ASHRAE, 1997). A weighted average of heat capacity values based on the indicated formation was used to determine an average heat capacity of 31.0 Btu/ft³-°F for the formation. A diffusivity value was then found using the calculated formation thermal conductivity and the estimated heat capacity. The thermal diffusivity for this formation was estimated to be **0.86 ft²/day**.



## CERTIFICATE OF CALIBRATION

GRTI maintains calibration of the datalogger, current transducer and voltage transducer on a biannual schedule per the manufacturers recommendations. The components are calibrated by the manufacturer using recognized national or international measurement standards such as those maintained by the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST).

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Montgomery Township Police Department continues to be one of only a handful of agencies in the area that conducts Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) training. DARE is a police officer-led series of classroom lessons that teaches children at the elementary education level how to resist peer pressure and live productive drug and violence-free lives. This program is currently conducted at all elementary schools in Montgomery Township. Currently the Police Department has two officers teaching DARE in our three elementary schools.

In January of 2014, a DARE Instructor Training Program is being held at the New York State Fire Academy in Montour Falls, New York. During the two week program DARE officers receive specialized instruction in public speaking, classroom management techniques, lesson planning, and team building. Officers also learn to teach the DARE curriculum, presenting a mock lesson to instructors prior to completion of the program. Officers Thomas Ward and Brandi McCoy have been chosen to attend this training.

#### BACKGROUND:

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) recently announced that the FY2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant application period opened on November 4, 2013 and will close on December 6, 2013. The approved federal funding for the FY2013 AFG Grant is \$288 million. The goal of the AFG grant is to enhance, through financial assistance, the safety of the public and firefighters regarding fire and firerelated hazards.

Specifically, the program provides grant funding to assist local fire departments in the following three areas:

- Operations and Safety
- Vehicle Acquisition
- Joint/Regional Applications

Under this grant program, fire companies can either apply as an individual organization or a group of fire companies can file a joint application as a "regional project". A regional project is one in which multiple organizations serving more than one local jurisdiction benefit directly from the activities implemented with the grant funds. Regional projects are designed to facilitate interoperability and efficiency among the participating jurisdictions.

In 2012, the Montgomery County Board of Commissioners announced a \$29.97 million upgrade to the aging, fault-prone radio system used by first responders throughout the county. The Commissioners also announced that the individual emergency service organizations would be responsible to purchase their own radios. As a result, all EMS, Fire and Police Departments in Montgomery County will need to purchase new radios in order to operate on the County's upgrades system. Montgomery Township Volunteer Fire Department and the Department of Fire services will need to replace seventy one (71) radios as a result of this upgrade.

After speaking with several local fire companies, it was agreed upon by the Hatboro, Horsham and Montgomery Township Fire Departments to submit a regional grant application to purchase the radios in an effort to receive more favorable consideration of our grant application.

In addition to purchasing radios, the FDMT intends to submit a grant application to replace its aging selfcontained breathing apparatus (SCBA). According to the grant program, DHS considers SCBA to be considered obsolete if it is a minimum of two NFPA cycles or 10 years of age or older. Award will be based on number of seated riding positions in the department's vehicle fleet and the age of existing SCBA. After evaluating our existing equipment, it was determined that twenty (20) of our thirty-six (36) SCBA units are considered by DHS to be obsolete. Due to recent technological advances and changes to the NFPA standard, the FDMT proposes to replace all of its existing SCBA and purchase an additional eight (8) units so that every riding position on the apparatus will be equipped with a SCBA unit.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

Fire departments serving populations more than 20,000 residents, but not more than 1,000,000 residents. the applicant shall be required to provide a cost share of non-federal funds of ten (10%) percent of the total project cost.

If the DFS/FDMT is awarded a FY2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant for the purchase of the radios and SCBA, the total cost of the projects would be approximately \$284,000.00 and \$240,000.00, respectively. Based on the grants cost sharing requirements, the DFS/FDMT would be required to provide \$52,400.00. The project period for any award under the Assistance to Firefighters Grant is 12 months from the date of the award. If the grant applications are awarded, funding for the cost share can be given consideration in the 2014 DFS and FDMT budget process.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors approve the submission of grant applications for the FY2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant in the amount of \$524,000.00 for the purchase of seventy-one (71) radios and forty-four (44) SCBA.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Canon Business lease on the six pieces of photocopier equipment in the Police, Administration, Finance, Battalion 1, Zoning and Public Works is scheduled to expire on March 19, 2014. Canon has approached staff with an offer to renew early for another 48 month term.

Attached is a proposal from Canon Business Solutions, authorized vendor under the Co-Stars Cooperative Purchase program Contract # 4400003118 to provide a 48 month lease for six new copiers that meet or exceed the current equipment standards at an annual cost of \$22,288. This new lease offers several incentive for the Township:

- 1. Lowers our monthly payment from \$1937.50 to \$1838.81
- 2. Reduces our color output from \$.075 to \$.069 per page
- 3. Adds stapling to all units
- 4. Includes fax boards for all units
- 5. Adds color to Police unit (And the Emergency Operation Center as a result)
- 6. Eliminates restocking/removal fee for current units
- 7. Eliminates need to train staff as interface will be nearly identical to current units

#### **ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS:**

The Second Class Township Code requires that annual purchases of like goods \$10,000 or more require

formal bidding in accordance with the procedures in the Second Class Township Code including approval by the Board of Supervisors at a public meeting. Purchases for the Pennsylvania Department of General Services Cooperative Purchasing and the Co-Stars Cooperative Purchase Programs may be substituted for formal bidding subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors. Cooperative purchasing programs use the purchasing power of local entities to obtain more competitive pricing and choice than individual municipalities might be able to obtain on their own. The Township also saves on the expense of preparation of bid specifications, notice and advertising

#### **BUDGET IMPACT:**

A total of \$22,700 was included in the 2013 Approved Final Budget for the annual Lease/operation costs for copiers. The actual cost under the Co-Stars Leasing Contract would be \$22,288.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the award of the 48 Month lease contract for six Photo Copiers for the Police, Administration, Finance, DFS, Zoning and Public Works Departments per the approved 2013 Budget to Canon Business Solutions.

I represent and am writing on behalf of Druzak Merchant Development, Incl. "Druzak Merchant"). Druzak Merchant is a franchisee of Quaker Steak & Lube.

In order to open and operate a restaurant in Montgomery Township, Druzak Merchant must secure a restaurant liquor license. No Montgomery Township license is available for purchase at this time. As a result, Druzak Merchant has entered into an agreement to purchase a license from outside of Montgomery Township and plans to move the license into Montgomery Township, with the approval of the township, pursuant to the inter-municipal transfer provisions of the Liquor Code (47 P.S. 461).

The Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board requires that a resolution approving an inter-municipal transfer include the name of the applicant (here, "Druzak Merchant Development, Inc."), the address to which the license is being transferred (here, 790 Upper Street Road, Montgomery Township, Montgomeryville, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania), the liquor license number (here, R-17772), and it must state that a public hearing was held.

Effective July 1, 2006, the Liquor Code (47 P.S. §102) was amended to require that notice of a public hearing must be published once each week for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the municipality. Further, such notices must state the time and place of the hearing and the matter to be considered at the hearing. Amended Section 102 also provides that the first publication shall not be more than 30 days and the second publication shall not be less than seven (7) days from the date of the hearing.

At the time of the hearing, we will present complete information on the operations of Druzak Merchant's Quaker Steak & Lube and answer any questions that the township Board of Supervisors, solicitor or residents might have. Montgomery Township's approval of an inter-municipal transfer of a liquor license by Druzak Merchant will permit the operation of a restaurant in Montgomery Township that will be a positive attribute to the township and its residents.
