1. Call to Order: The October 11, 2021 public meeting of the Montgomery Township Board of Supervisors was held at the Montgomery Township Municipal Building, 1001 Stump Road, Montgomeryville, PA. Chair Tanya C. Bamford called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

- **2. & 3. Pledge of Allegiance and Announcements:** Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the following announcements were made by Ms. Bamford:
 - October 23rd is National Drug Take Back Day from 10 am to 1 pm at the Township's Community and Recreation Center. This is a drive-thru event.
 - On October 30th the Township is partnering with Senator Maria Collett's office and holding a FREE shredding event at the William F. Maule Park at Windlestrae. Residents are limited to 4 file-sized boxes per car and no bound materials can be accepted.
 - The Montgomery Township Police Department is collecting non-perishable food items in support of Montgomery County Children & Youth Services for Thanksgiving Dinners for families in financial hardship. Donations will be accepted in the Township Building Lobby from September 27th to October 31st.
 - On November 12th -14th Montgomery Township will host the 2021 United States Police Canine Association Region 6 "Police Dog 1" Field Trials. This event will be held at Windlestrae Park and is open to the public to view during the certification events.
 - On Friday, October 8, Township Manager Carolyn McCreary and Chair Tanya Bamford were invited by the Pennsylvania Municipal League to participate in a round table discussion at the 2021 Municipal Leadership Summit on the topic of Elected Officials-Manager Relations. Ms. McCreary and Ms. Bamford were grateful for the opportunity to share their experiences and offer insight in how to foster a solid working relationship with both the elected and appointed officials who attended in-person and virtually.
- **4. Public Comment** There was no public comment.
- **5. Announcement of Executive Session** Township Solicitor Sean Kilkenny, Esquire, announced that the Board of Supervisors met in an Executive Session prior to this public meeting at 6:15 p.m.

6. Consent Agenda:

MOTION: Upon motion by Mr. Quigg, seconded by Ms. Long and unanimously carried, the minutes of the September 27, 2021 meeting and the Bills List dated October 11, 2021 were approved as presented.

7a. & b. Presentations: Ms. Bamford presented a check in the amount of \$1,500 to the Visiting Nurses Association Community Services organization. Executive Director Richard Cirko was present to accept the donation. Ms. Bamford also presented a check in the amount of \$6,000 to the Montgomery Township Historical Society.

7c. Presentation: Montgomery United Soccer – Request to Develop Turf Fields – Troy Moyer, Vice President and Brent Whiting, President of Montgomery United Soccer, presented information relating to their request that the Township consider installing turf fields at one of its parks. Mr. Whiting touched on the general reasons why turf fields should be considered: rain closures, treatment closures, revenue generation for township businesses, rental income opportunity, cost savings of grass maintenance, new Turf technology is environmentally more friendly than fertilizer, and opportunities for lacrosse and field hockey to join the community. The Board discussed options, including long term capital planning, the recent borrowing for current Township infrastructure upkeep, and expectation of rental income from turf fields in comparison to its use by MonU. The Board agreed to budget for a \$10,000 feasibility study in the 2022 budget. There was no public comment and the Board thanked Mr. Moyer and Mr. Whiting for their presentation.

Planning & Zoning:

8. Waiver of Special Event Permit Fee: Bharatiya Temple:

MOTION: Upon motion by Ms. Bamford, seconded by Mr. Quigg and unanimously carried, the Board authorized a waiver of permit fee for the Bharatiya Temple Ravan Effigy Burning special event in the amount of \$100.00.

9. Escrow Release #4 – PEMV Partners, LP – 1274 Welsh Road (Pete's Car Wash):

MOTION: Upon motion by Ms. Bamford, seconded by Ms. Staab and unanimously carried, the Board authorized a construction escrow release in the amount of \$42,276.29 as recommended by the Township Engineer for PEMV Partners, LP contingent upon payment of all outstanding bills.

Public Safety:

10. Appointment and swearing in of FDMT Special Fire Police Officer:

MOTION: Upon motion by Mr. Quigg, seconded by Ms. Long and unanimously carried, the Board appointed Michael Stachowicz to the position of Special Fire Police Officer, effective October 11, 2021 and welcomed him to Montgomery Township.

Administration & Finance:

11. Distribution of 2021 Act 205 General Municipal Pension System State Aid: Ms. McCreary reported that the State requires that the Board of Supervisors adopt a resolution approving the allocation of the State Aid to the pension systems for its employees.

MOTION: Upon motion by Mr. Quigg, seconded by Ms. Staab and unanimously carried, the Board accepted the recommendation to allocate the 2021 Act 205 General Municipal Pension System State Aid to the Police Pension Plan in the amount of \$316,620.65 and to the Non-Uniformed Employee Pension Plan in the amount of \$206,283.15.

Other Business:

Ms. Bamford thanked Township staff and others who volunteered on Saturday, October 9th to support the Halloween Trick or Treat Drive Thru event at the William F. Maule Park at Windlestrae. The event was well received by residents, and it was estimated that 630 bags were handed out to children and over 450 vehicles passed through the event.

15. Adjournment: Upon motion by Ms. Bamford and seconded by Mr. Quigg, the meeting was adjourned at 7:52 p.m.

MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP LEGAL NOTICE

On Monday, October 25, 2021, at 7:00 p.m. the Montgomery Township Board of Supervisors, during its regularly scheduled meeting, will conduct a public hearing to consider the Conditional Use Application of Westrum Development Company ("Applicant"):

The Application involves tax parcel 46-00-00124-00-1. This parcel does not have a street address but is located behind the Rodeway Inn at 969 Bethlehem Pike, Montgomery Township, Pennsylvania (the "Property"). The property is presently vacant and consists of approximately ten (10) acres in the Limited Industrial (LI) and Highway Limited Industrial Overlay (HLI). The Applicant proposes to develop a lifestyle apartment building on the subject property. A lifestyle apartment is permitted to be developed in the Limited Industrial Zoning District as a conditional use pursuant to Section 230-103.C(4).

The Applicant has requested approval to construct a lifestyle apartment in the Limited Industrial District, by submitting a conditional use application on September 10, 2021. The conditional use application is on file at the Planning and Zoning Office at the Township Building and may be inspected by appointment.

The public is invited to attend and will be given an opportunity to provide comments regarding this proposed conditional use. There will be limited capacity for in-person attendance due to COVID-19 requirements. Once capacity is reached, no other attendees will be permitted in the meeting room. Safety guidelines, including maintaining social distance and wearing a mask, must be followed by those attending in-person. BACKGROUND:

Keystone Homebrew is located at 435 Doylestown Road. The 1.7 acre property sits within the R-5 Residential zoning district and is currently improved with a one-story 19,835 square foot building, two pole barns, and associated parking. Keystone Homebrew received relief in 2009 to permit the following uses:

- 1. Keystone Homebrew retail store
- 2. Brewing facility with school and classroom
- 3. Beer/wine manufacturing / warehousing
- 4. Accessory café for the retail sales of specialty and craft beers, PA wines, food in accordance with the requirements of the PALCB.
- 5. Special Events, including outdoor events throughout the calendar year.
- 6. Storage in pole barns and within the main building.

In 2011, the applicant, sought and received modification of the 2009 Decision to permit the wine making facility replacing the beer making and to modify certain previously imposed conditions.

The applicant currently requests amendments to the previous Decisions and/or relief from the provisions of Sections 230-64 and 230-134C, with regards to the use and parking, in order to allow outdoor dining on the property to the extent that was previously approved under the 2020 Temporary Approval provided by the Township as a result of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION:

Temporary Outdoor dining was allowed due to the impact of COVID-19 along the Montgomery Avenue side of the property. Unknown at that time, the area requested sits within the Public Right-of-way owned by Montgomery Township. If it was known at that time, a permit would not have been issued to use this area for outdoor dining.

As confirmed during discussion with the Zoning Hearing Board at the October 6, 2021 hearing ("Hearing"), attached is a more detailed plan of the proposed outdoor dining areas for the above noted property. The enclosed plan was prepared by EK3 Design Architects, is dated October 14, 2021, and numbered SP1.1. For purposes of clarity of the record, I request the enclosed be marked as Applicant's Exhibit A-10.

As discussed during the Hearing and further reconfirmed on the enclosed:

- Applicant received permits from the Township in the summer of 2020 for temporary outdoor dining in the areas designated as Areas 1 and 3 on the enclosed plan. Those permits included 24'-4" of clear dining space between the sidewalk and inside face of knee wall/block bollards at Area 1. (Ex A-6, entered 10/6/21).
- Per discussion with the Board, the attached proposes to maintain both Areas 1 and 3 as permanent outdoor dining locations, subject to certain additional considerations and conditions:
 - o The depth of Area 1 has been reduced to 18'-0" to the *outermost* face of the block bollards so that the whole of Area 1 is within the area that is currently striped for parking spaces. This also reduces the clear dining space between the sidewalk and inside face of knee wall/block bollards to approximately 15'-6" (+/-).
 - As confirmed during the Hearing, the Applicant proposes a total of fifty (50) outdoor dining seats between Areas 1 and 3 but requests the flexibility to adjust the location of outdoor seating as needed between Areas 1 and 3, depending on

customer demand. A note is included on Exhibit-10 confirming that at no time would the total outdoor seating exceed 50 seats combined.

o Finally, as discussed during the Hearing, and understanding that a portion of the existing parking and landscape improvements along the Montgomery frontage are within the right-of-way, the Applicant has no objection to a condition of approval for Area 1 that would require the Applicant to enter into a right-of-way agreement with the Township wherein the Applicant would, *inter alia*, indemnify the Township, provide proof of insurance, assume continued maintenance of Area 1 (Applicant currently maintains the parking and landscaping improvements along the entire Montgomery frontage, including Area 1), and such other terms and conditions as would be deemed satisfactory by the Township Solicitor.

I trust that the within Exhibit A-10 provide the additional clarity the Board is seeking I would like to thank both you and the Board again for your careful consideration of this matter and the opportunity to provide additional information to clarify the testimony as provided. 



Earlier this year, the Police Department's Highway Safety Unit was asked to prepare a study regarding truck traffic traveling on Country Club Drive and Pinecrest Lane. This study was initiated when property damage occurred after a tractor-trailer attempted to make a right turn into the development. Upon consultation with the Township's Traffic Engineer, Gilmore & Associates, Inc., it was recommended that truck traffic travel be prohibited on Country Club Drive and Pinecrest Lane due to road alignment issues and inadequate turning radii. It should be noted that this ordinance amendment will not restrict local deliveries to or pickups from premises located along these affected streets.

PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION:

The Board of Supervisors authorized the advertisement of the proposed ordinance amendment at the September 27, 2021, public meeting.

Signs will come out of the Public Works operating budget for traffic-related items.

AN ORDINANCE OF MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP, MONTGOMERY COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 222 OF THE MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE-VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC, ARTICLE III VEHICLE WEIGHT AND TYPE RESTRICTIONS, SECTION 222-18 TRUCK TRAFFIC RESTRICTED; PENALTY; REPEALING ALL INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES, OR PARTS THEREOF; AND PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE AND EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, certain streets or roads exist within Montgomery Township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania ("Township") where truck traffic has become problematic or a change in conditions has occurred to warrant a re-evaluation of whether trucks should be prohibited from operating; and

WHEREAS, the Montgomery Township Board of Supervisors ("Supervisors"), in order to advance the welfare and safety of the residents of the Township and such other persons who use said streets and roads, deems it necessary to enact restrictions on truck traffic on certain streets and roads in the Township; and

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED AND ENACTED by the Board of Supervisors of Montgomery Township as follows:

I. Chapter 222, Article III Vehicle Weight and Type Restrictions, section 222-18 Truck traffic restricted; penalty:

Chapter 222, Section 18, Truck traffic restricted; penalties.

§ 222-18. Truck traffic restricted; penalty.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle other than a passenger car, motorcycle, pickup truck or van on any of the following streets or parts of streets:

Name of Street	Limits
Montgomery Glen Drive	Between Doylestown Road and Horsham Road (Route 463)
Country Club Drive	Entire Length
Pinecrest Lane	Entire Length

- B. Nothing in this section shall prohibit any person from driving an emergency vehicle on any of those streets or parts of streets or from driving on any of those streets or parts of streets a truck or other commercial vehicle making local deliveries to or pickups from premises located along that street or part of a street.
- C. Any person who violates any provision of this section shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and costs.

II. Severability.

The terms, conditions and provisions of this Chapter are hereby declared to be severable, and, should any portion, part or provision of this Chapter be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, unenforceable or unconstitutional, the Montgomery Township Board of Supervisors hereby declares its intent that the Chapter shall have been repealed without regard to the invalid, unenforceable, or unconstitutional portion, part or provision of this Chapter.

III. Repealer.

Any and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the terms, conditions and provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such irreconcilable conflict.

IV. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be effective immediately enactment.

SETTLEMENT OVERVIEW

After years of negotiations, two proposed nationwide settlement agreements ("Settlements") have been reached that would resolve all opioid litigation brought by states and local political subdivisions against the three largest pharmaceutical distributors, McKesson, Cardinal Health and AmerisourceBergen ("Distributors"), and one manufacturer, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and its parent company Johnson & Johnson (collectively, "Janssen").

The proposed Settlements require the Distributors and Janssen to pay billions of dollars to abate the opioid epidemic. Specifically, the Settlements require the Distributors to pay up to \$21 billion over 18 years and Janssen to pay up to \$5 billion over no more than 9 years, for a total of \$26 billion (the "Settlement Amount"). Of the Settlement Amount, approximately \$22.7 billion is earmarked for use by participating states and subdivisions to remediate and abate the impacts of the opioid crisis.

The Settlements also contain injunctive relief provisions governing the opioid marketing, sale and distribution practices at the heart of the states' and subdivisions' lawsuits and further require the Distributors to implement additional safeguards to prevent diversion of prescription opioids.

Each of the proposed Settlements has two key participation steps. First, each state decides whether to participate in the Settlements. Pennsylvania has joined both Settlements. Second, the subdivisions within each participating state must then decide whether to participate in the Settlements. Generally, the more subdivisions that participate, the greater the amount of funds that flow to that state and its participating subdivisions. Any subdivision that does not participate cannot directly share in any of the settlement funds, even if the subdivision's state is settling and other participating subdivisions are sharing in settlement funds.

This letter is part of the formal notice required by the Settlements.

WHY IS YOUR SUBDIVISION RECEIVING THIS NOTICE?

You are receiving this letter because Pennsylvania has elected to participate in both of the two national Settlements against (1) the Distributors, and (2) Janssen, and your subdivision may participate in the Settlements to which your state has agreed. This notice is being sent directly to subdivisions and also to attorneys for subdivisions that we understand are litigating against these companies. If you are represented by an attorney with respect to opioid claims, please immediately contact them. Please note that there is no need for subdivisions to be represented by an attorney or to have filed a lawsuit to participate in the Settlements.

WHERE CAN YOU FIND MORE INFORMATION?

This letter is intended to provide a brief overview of the Settlements. Detailed information about the Settlements may be found at: https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/. This national settlement website also includes links to information about how the Settlements are being implemented in your state and how settlement funds will be allocated within your state. This website will be supplemented as additional documents are created.

HOW DO YOU PARTICIPATE IN THE SETTLEMENTS?

You must go to the national settlement website to register to receive in the coming weeks and months the documentation your subdivision will need to participate in the Settlements (if your subdivision is eligible). All required documentation must be executed and submitted electronically through the website and must be executed using the "DocuSign" service. As part of the registration process, your subdivision will need to identify, and provide the email address for, the individual who will be authorized to sign formal and binding documents on behalf of your subdivision.

HOW WILL SETTLEMENT FUNDS BE ALLOCATED IN EACH STATE?

The settlement funds are first divided among the participating states according to a formula developed by the Attorneys General that considers population and the severity of harm caused by the opioid epidemic in each participating state. Each state's share of the abatement funds is then further allocated within each state according to agreement between the state and its subdivisions, applicable state allocation legislation, or, in the absence of these, the default provisions in the agreements.

Many states have or are in the process of reaching an agreement on how to allocate abatement funds within the states. Allocation agreements/legislation and other information about Pennsylvania's allocation agreement or legislation can be found on the national settlement website. The allocation section of the website will be supplemented as more intra-state allocation arrangements are finalized.

In reviewing allocation information, please note that while all subdivisions may participate in the Settlements, not all subdivisions are eligible to receive direct payments. To promote efficiency in the use of abatement funds and avoid administratively burdensome disbursements that would be too small to add a meaningful abatement response, certain smaller subdivisions do not automatically receive a direct allocation. However, participation by such subdivisions will help maximize the amount of abatement funds being paid in the Settlements, including those going to counties, cities, parishes, and other larger subdivisions in their communities.

To determine your eligibility to receive, directly or indirectly, any of the funds allocated to your state should you elect to participate in the Settlements in which your state participates, you should first visit https://nationalopioidsettlement.com/ to determine if your state has entered into a state-subdivision agreement or has an allocation statute and/or a statutory trust. If so, then the terms of the state-subdivision agreement, allocation statute, and/or statutory trust (as applicable) will govern your eligibility to receive funds directly or indirectly from the share that is allocated to your state under the national settlement agreements. In some states there will be a proposed state-subdivision agreement that is in the process of being adopted by subdivisions. Any questions concerning the status or terms of the state-subdivision agreement, allocation statute, and/or statutory trust in your state, if applicable, can be directed to the Attorney General's Office.

You may be contacted by the Attorney General's Office with additional information regarding the allocation of settlement funds in Pennsylvania. Subdivisions with representation can expect information from their attorneys as well. We encourage you to review all materials and to follow up with any questions. The terms of these Settlements are complex and we want to be sure you have all the information you need to make your participation decision.

WHY YOU SHOULD PARTICIPATE

A vast majority of states have joined the Settlements, and attorneys for many subdivisions have already announced support for them. For example, the Plaintiffs' Executive Committee, charged with leading the litigation on behalf of more than 3,000 cities, counties and others against the opioid industry, and consolidated in the national multi-district litigation ("MDL") pending before Judge Dan Aaron Polster in the Northern District of Ohio, recommends participation in these Settlements.

Subdivision participation is strongly encouraged, for the following reasons:

First, the amounts to be paid under the Settlements, while insufficient to abate the epidemic fully, will allow state and local governments to commence with meaningful change designed to curb opioid addiction, overdose and death;

Second, time is of the essence. The opioid epidemic continues to devastate communities around the country and it is critical that the funds begin to flow to allow governments to address the epidemic in their communities as soon as possible;

Third, if there is not sufficient subdivision participation in these proposed Settlements, the Settlements will not be finalized, the important business practice changes will not be implemented, the billions of dollars in abatement funds will not flow to communities, and more than 3,000 cases may be sent back to their home courts for trial, which will take many years;

Fourth, the extent of participation also will determine how much money each state and its local subdivisions will receive because approximately half of the abatement funds are in the form of "incentive payments," *i.e.*, the higher the participation of subdivisions in a state, the greater the amount of settlement funds that flow into that state;

Fifth, you know first-hand the effects of the opioid epidemic on your community. Funds from these Settlements will be used to commence abatement of the crisis and provide relief to your citizens while litigation and settlement discussions proceed against numerous other defendants in the opioid industry; and

Sixth, because pills do not respect boundaries, the opioid epidemic is a national crisis that needs a national solution.

NEXT STEPS

These Settlements require that you take affirmative steps to "opt in" to the Settlements. If you do not act, you will not receive any settlement funds and you will not contribute to reaching the participation thresholds that will deliver the maximum amount of abatement funds to your state.

First, register your subdivision on the national settlement website so that information and documents required to participate can be sent to you. You will need the email address of the person who will be authorized to sign on behalf of your subdivision. This is the only action item needed at this time.

Second, have your authorizing person(s) or body begin to review the materials on the websites concerning the settlement agreement terms, allocation and other matters. Develop a list of questions for your counsel or the Attorney General's Office. In the very near future, your subdivision will need to begin the process of deciding whether to participate in the proposed Settlements, and subdivisions are encouraged to work through this process well before the January 2, 2022 deadline to be an initial participating subdivision. Again, the Attorney General's Office, your counsel, and other contacts within the state are available to discuss the specifics of the Settlements within your state, and we encourage you to discuss the terms and benefits of the Settlements with them.

Third, monitor your email for further communications, which will include a Participation Agreement, Release, (where applicable) a model Resolution, and instructions on executing and submitting electronically using DocuSign.

Attached is a revenue and expenditure report as of 09/30/2021 for the Montgomery Township 2021 budget.

2021 Budget Summary – as of 09/30/21:

The General Fund total revenues are \$11,779,363 or 87.51% of total budget. Major revenue sources comprise \$10,075,302 of the total revenues. Total real estate collections are at 103.15%. Earned Income Tax is currently at 83.88% of budget and Local Services Tax is 74.73%. Both Mercantile and Business Privilege Taxes are trending as previous year at 96.67% (\$1,754,472) and 106.04% (\$954,374). On an accrual accounting basis, R.E. Transfer Tax is at \$832,323 or 114.80% of budget.

Total expenditures are \$9,644,208 or 71.65% of total budget. All Departments are tracking as expected. Two categories, Tax Collection (77.15%) and Fire Protection (192.31%) are departments that have a majority of their expenses in the first quarter. In Tax Collection, a majority of costs are related to printing of the tax bills in February. Fire Protection within the General Fund has two major expenses in the first quarter: workers compensation and the volunteer fire stipend.

On September 15, 2021, Officer Eufrasio, Officer Schott, Officer Woch, Officer Rardin, Officer Hernandez, and Sergeant Wagner attended Street Cop Search and Seizure training at the Montgomery Township Community Recreation Center.

On September 16, 2021, Officer McGuigan attended a Canine Operations and Civil Liability seminar at the Montgomery Township Community Recreation Center.

From September 20, 2021, through September 24, 2021, Chief Bendig attended the Reducing Racial and Ethnic Disparities Juvenile Justice Certificate Program in Harrisburg, PA.

On September 28, 2021, Officer Seydel and Officer Byrne attended LETI (Law Enforcement Treatment Initiative) training at the Montgomery County Public Safety Training Campus.

On September 29, 2021, Officer Dobson attended EVOC (Emergency Vehicle Operator Course) training at the Montgomery County Public Safety Training Campus.

On September 29, 2021, Sergeant Hart, Officer Rose, Officer McGuigan, and Officer Woch attended Canine In-Service training in Montgomery Township, PA.

During September, all sworn members of the department attended a 12-hour block of Departmental training and certification at the Montgomery Township Community Recreation Center on the following topics:

- Use of Force Policy
- Handcuffing
- Pepper Spray

- Baton
- Defensive Tactics

NOTED INCIDENTS:

On September 5, 2021, officers responded to the Hampton Inn on Garden Golf Boulevard for a theft from a vehicle. Upon arrival, officers met the victim, who advised her wallet had been stolen from her vehicle and her credit cards were used in fraudulent purchases totaling over \$1,000.00. Officers reviewed surveillance video from the Hampton Inn and the locations where the card was fraudulently used. Officers were able to identify the subject involved in the theft and credit card use after linking her to information provided during one of the unauthorized purchases. Officers contacted the subject, who subsequently admitted to the theft and unauthorized purchase. The subject was arrested for access device fraud and related offenses.

On September 10, 2021, officers conducted a traffic stop of a blue Chevrolet on Bethlehem Pike at J.L. Freed Honda for an equipment violation. Officers approached the vehicle and spoke with the occupants. While speaking with the occupants, officers noted their nervous and deceptive behavior. Additionally, officers observed drug paraphernalia in plain view. Officers spoke with the driver and requested consent to search the vehicle. The driver denied consent to search the vehicle, so a canine was requested for a search. While awaiting the canine, officers spoke with one of the occupants, who admitted that they were returning from Philadelphia and all three vehicle occupants had drugs in their possession. A search of the vehicle's exterior indicated the presence of drugs. The vehicle was impounded, and a request for a search warrant was filed. After approval of the search warrant, a search was conducted, revealing several bundles of heroin and other drug paraphernalia. All three occupants were charged with violations of the Drug Act.

On September 24, 2021, officers partnered with the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office Narcotics Enforcement Team, monitoring activity at local hotels for drug and other criminal activity in Montgomery Township. Officers focused on those hotels with a high call volume for police services, such as noise complaints, disturbances, thefts, warrant arrests, and drug arrests. During their operation, officers arrested a subject who purchased eleven bags of crack cocaine. Officers also identified the subject who sold the drugs, taking him into custody as well. The information obtained from this arrest is currently being used in an ongoing investigation by the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office Narcotics Enforcement Team.

On September 25, 2021, officers conducted a traffic stop on a black Mazda on Bethlehem Pike at North Wales Road after learning that the driver may have an active warrant. Officers approached the vehicle and made contact with the driver. Officers confirmed the driver had a warrant out of Philadelphia for dangerous drugs. The driver was taken into custody.

A subsequent search of the driver revealed heroin and drug paraphernalia. Officers acknowledged the driver's drug addiction and referred him to Montgomery County's Law Enforcement Treatment Initiative (LETI) Program. The program was created to help offenders get into treatment facilities in lieu of criminal charges. At the successful completion of the treatment, the subject's charges will be withdrawn. Montgomery Township Police Department has made the most referrals to the LETI Program since its implementation in Montgomery County in June 2021.

On September 28, 2021, officers responded to a home in the 100 block of Forest Tail Drive for a domestic disturbance. As officers entered the development, they observed a red Jeep leaving the area at a high rate of speed. Officers continued to the home. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the victim and learned that a verbal altercation with her boyfriend had become threatening in nature. During the argument, the boyfriend got in his vehicle, began revving his engine, then drove towards the victim while she was standing on the front lawn. Other officers located the boyfriend in the red Jeep as he sat in traffic on Horsham Road at the Five Points Intersection. Officers approached the vehicle, ordering the boyfriend to shut the vehicle off. The boyfriend suddenly accelerated, driving over a concrete divider on the roadway, nearly striking officers and other vehicles as the vehicle traveled in the wrong direction through the intersection. Officers continued to check the area, locating the subject parked in Lowe's parking lot. Officers were able to approach the vehicle and take the boyfriend into custody. The boyfriend was charged with simple assault, reckless endangerment, and related offenses.

On Wednesday, September 29, 2021, at 5:20 AM, officers responded to the area of North Wales Road and Montgomery Glen Drive for a juvenile female walking in the roadway with no shoes or socks. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the four-year-old female, who only spoke Spanish. While speaking with the child, she told officers she had been walking for five hours. As officers spoke with the child, she received a video call from a subject in Honduras on the phone she was carrying. Officers spoke with the subject from Honduras, who stated that the juvenile's aunt lived nearby. Officers took protective custody of the child and transported her to the station. Montgomery County Children and Youth Services were contacted and advised of the incident. Officers were able to locate the child's mother, who advised she dropped her daughter off at her sister's house near Montgomery Glen Drive at 5:00 AM because she had to go to work in Franconia. The investigation revealed that the child walked out of the home unbeknownst to her aunt. The mother permitted the aunt to take custody of the juvenile. A Childline report was completed, and Montgomery County Children and Youth Services will continue their investigation.

On September 29, 2021, officers conducted a traffic stop on a black Buick on Bethlehem Pike at Evans Road for a suspended registration. Officers approached the vehicle and made contact with the vehicle occupants. While speaking to the occupants, officers observed a large amount of new, unbagged merchandise strewn throughout the vehicle. Officers inquired about the items, and the occupants gave inconsistent stories on how they obtained the merchandise and could not provide receipts for the merchandise. A routine check of the occupants was conducted, revealing the driver had an active arrest warrant from the Bucks County Sheriff's Office for theft charges. Officer's advised the driver of the outstanding warrant and attempted to take her into custody. The driver resisted arrest and ignored the officer's commands to comply. The driver was subsequently taken into custody and transported back to the station. A routine search of the driver at the station revealed oxycodone pills. In addition to the warrant, the driver was charged with resisting arrest and violations of the Drug Act.

On September 29, 2021, officers responded to the area of Bethlehem Pike and DeKalb Pike for a reckless driver. The caller reported that a silver Toyota was driving on the wrong side of the road. Officers located the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop. Officers spoke with the driver, noting that he was unsteady on his feet and was slurring his words. While conversing with the officers, the driver stated he had recently ingested Phencyclidine. Officers requested the driver perform field sobriety tests, which he failed. The driver was taken into custody for driving under the influence. The driver had three recent DUI arrests and was driving with a DUI suspended driver's license. The driver was remanded to Montgomery County Correctional Facility after failing to post bail.
