This report has been created to provide you with a brief snapshot of the Department's activity in 2019 to include community programs, Department news, and statistical information. In this year's Annual Report, we have chosen to spotlight some of the technology that the members of our Department utilize to provide police services to our community. One of the Department's major initiatives in 2019 was the implementation of our body-worn camera program. With the financial assistance of both the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency and the Department of Justice, the Department was able to secure funding to purchase a body camera for every sworn officer in the Department. The Department's body-worn camera program provides for better evidence collection, enhanced officer accountability, more accurate documentation of the events, improved communication between the police and the public, and the ability to use the videos as training tools for improving police performance.



Police Technology

Ever wonder what a police vehicle is equipped with? What happens when a prisoner is brought back to the station? What does a body camera look like? Montgomery Township Police Department uses some of the latest technology to aid in everyday police work. This section will go over some technology that our police officers use while on duty.

Body Camera and In-Car Camera Systems

In 2019, the police department adopted the use of officer-worn body cameras and upgraded the existing patrol car camera and audio system. The new body cameras and car camera systems provide officers with the ability to document police interactions with the public and offenders. The new body camera and car camera system is able to link video and audio recordings from different officers and synchronize them for an accurate account of police interactions.



ALPR (Automatic License Plate Recognition)

Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) systems are one of the most powerful tools now available to law enforcement agencies. These systems have the ability to identify vehicles that may have arrest warrants associated with them, while increasing officer efficiency and safety. ALPR systems are also capable of assisting officers to keep the streets safe by providing vehicle information to include insurance cancelations, suspended registrations, stolen vehicles, and other vehicle registration violations.



Noptic and Scion Thermal Devices

The Scion Thermal Device is a handheld monocular that gives officers the ability to see heat sources under diminished light situations. This

handheld thermal imager provides officers a valuable tool for the detection of suspects and evidence as well as the ability to locate a missing subject in an area with heavy vegetation. This handheld thermal device is pivotal in areas where a police vehicle-mounted thermal camera is unable to be used due to terrain or stealthy necessities. The Noptic thermal device is a thermal camera that is mounted on the spotlight of a police vehicle. The thermal image is shown on the police vehicles in-car computer. By mounting the thermal camera on the spotlight, the camera can be swiveled for a greater viewing area.




Mobile Fingerprint Scanner

The mobile fingerprint scanner is a device that can be used on the street to assist law enforcement with the identity of a subject who is providing false identification to the police during an investigation. The mobile fingerprint scanner is also capable of verifying the identity of a subject that is suspected of having a warrant for their arrest. The device works by comparing fingerprints with records in the Pennsylvania State Police Automated Fingerprint Identification System through a secured server established by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association and the Pennsylvania Justice Network. Police are required to ask for consent before administering mobile ID and, it can only be used in situations where reasonable suspicion exists.



Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) and Commonwealth Photo Imagine Network (CPIN)

The Montgomery Township Police Department houses an AFIS and CPIN system that is used for the processing of prisoners after they are arrested. The AFIS equipment allows officers to electronically capture a person's fingerprints that are automatically checked through the Pennsylvania State Police Automated Fingerprint Identification System and will provide the police officer with criminal arrest information for anytime the subject was fingerprinted regardless of the name they provided to law enforcement. The CPIN system is used to uniformly capture an arrested person's image and store it for future retrievals, facial recognition investigations, or investigative photograph arrays.



Montgomery County Judicial Video Conferencing Network

The Montgomery County Judicial Video Conferencing Network is a secure two way video and audio system. The Network allows law enforcement and Magisterial District Judges the ability to conduct preliminary arraignments in a physically secure environment. This is done within the department's detention facility while the Magisterial District Judge may remain at their corresponding district court facilities. The Montgomery County Judicial Video Conferencing Network can also be used for the judicial approval of search warrants and emergency Protection from Abuse Orders.



Do You Own a Ring Camera?

Montgomery Township Police Department is pleased to announce our partnership with Ring. Subscribers of Ring have an app known as the Neighbors App. This app is a digital neighborhood watch that both law enforcement and the public can access free of charge. As part of our partnership, Montgomery Township Police can send a message to Ring subscribers through the Neighbors App to request video from their camera when investigating an active incident in the area. The subscriber can then voluntarily choose to share video with the department. This partnership also increases communication with the community to alert of any incidents in the area. Montgomery Township Police can post information in the app to keep Ring subscribers informed of any incidents, crime, or issues in neighborhoods. 

Don't Fall Victim to Purse Theft


In 2019, Montgomery Township Police saw an increase in thefts from purses. You can protect yourself from this type of theft by practicing these simple suggestions:

- Hold your purse close to you when in crowds.
- When travelling, use anti-theft products such as a bra pouch or money belt.


