### **BE BRIGHT**


Wear brightly colored clothing or reflective gear at night.

Use crosswalks and intersections.


### **WATCH FOR TURNING**

# **Training**

### **Generic Greetings**

Phishing messages often begin with impersonal greetings.

# Asks for Senstive Information

Never provide personal, credit card, or account info via email, text, or phone.

### **Attachments**

Attachments can contain malware, so do not open unless you know its legitimate.

### **Poorly Written**

Typos, misspellings, and incorrect grammar are common in phishing messages.

### Fake URL

If the web address looks suspicious, don't click on anything.

# Sense of Urgency

Advise you to take immediate action and warn you of problems that will compromise your account if you don't.

# **Drug Take Back**

The department is proud to share that 106 pounds of expired and unused medication was collected for safe disposal during Drug Take Back Day on April 30th. A reminder that over-the-counter and prescription medications are collected year round at the department for safe disposal.





Distracted driving is any activity that takes your attention away from driving. This includes talking and texting on the phone, eating, talking to people in the car, changing the radio, using navigation, personal grooming, etc.

TEXTING is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text can take your eyes off the road for 5 seconds. At 55mph that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving is your **FULL ATTENTION**. Any activity you engage in while driving increases your risk of crashing. Don't be the cause of harm to yourself or anyone else.

### Communications

Communication Specialists are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at the Montgomery Township Police Department. The primary role of a Communication Specialist at the police department is to effectively and efficiently perform communication activities that assist in police services for the public, members of the township, and sworn personnel. The daily job requirements of a Communications Specialist include:

- Directing calls that come into the non-emergency line
- Operating a multitude of databases such as the National Crime Information Center, Montgomery Township Records Management System, and the Montgomery County CAD system
- Monitoring the cell block through CCTV
- Communicating on a township monitored radio as well as county monitored radio
- Performing clerical duties
- Assisting sworn personnel and the public

Communication Specialists work in a fast-paced environment and multitask throughout their day to ensure the safety of our officers and community.
