MINUTES OF MEETING MONTGOMERY TOWNSHIP BOARD OF SUPERVISORS JUNE 23, 2014

Chairman Joseph Walsh called the executive session to order at 7:00 p.m. In attendance were Supervisors Candyce Fluehr Chimera, Michael Fox and Jeffrey McDonnell.

Supervisor Robert Birch was absent. Also in attendance were Frank Bartle, Esquire, Lawrence Gregan, Bruce Shoupe and Police Chief J. Scott Bendig.

Chairman Joseph Walsh called the action meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. In attendance were Supervisors Candyce Fluehr Chimera, Michael Fox and Jeffrey McDonnell. Supervisor Robert Birch was absent. Also in attendance were Frank Bartle, Esquire, Lawrence Gregan, Chief J. Scott Bendig, Rick Lesniak, Ann Shade, Stacy Crandell, Kevin Costello, Bruce Shoupe, Richard Grier, Kelsey McMeans and Deb Rivas.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Chairman Joseph Walsh called for public comment from the audience and there was none.

Township Solicitor Frank Bartle, Esquire reported that the Board had met in an executive session earlier in the evening at 7:00 p.m. Mr. Bartle reported that the Board discussed three matters of potential litigation which were Zoning Hearing Board cases for Goodwill Keystone Area – 753 Bethlehem Pike, North Wales Plaza Associates – North Wales & Bethlehem Pike and Scott & Crystal Young – 207 Broad Acres Road. The Board also discussed a matter of litigation -Trippet vs. Montgomery Township officers, a Federal Court matter. Mr. Bartle also reported that these matters are legitimate subjects of executive session pursuant to Pennsylvania's Sunshine Law.

Chairman Joseph Walsh made a motion and Supervisor Michael Fox seconded the motion to approve the minutes of the June 9, 2014 Board meeting. The minutes of the meeting were unanimously approved as submitted.

Resolution #1, made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted unanimously, appointed Mary Griffith-Alfarano to the Finance Committee with a one year term set to expire on January 1, 2015.

Director of Administration and Human Resources Ann Shade reported that in March 2014, the National Recreation and Park Association instituted a new program in conjunction with Macy's "Heart Your Park" campaign to help raise awareness and funds for local parks across the country. The employees at the Montgomery Mall Macy's asked customers to donate \$1 or more at the time of purchase to be used for improvements/enhancements to the William F. Maule Park at Windlestrae. The Montgomery Mall Macy's matched customer contribution funds and recently sent a contribution check in the amount of \$250 to Montgomery Township. The money will be applied to the Capital Reserve Fund for Park Improvements at the William F. Maule Park at Windlestrae. Resolution #2 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Chimera and adopted unanimously, recognized and thanked Macy's and the National Recreation and Park Association for the funds donated as a result of the Macy's "Heart Your Park" Campaign.

Director of Planning Bruce Shoupe introduced revised land development plans for LDS #630 Firefox Townhouse Development which is located at the intersection of Line Street and Bethlehem Pike. The development is located partly in Montgomery Township and partly in Hatfield Township. One hundred and fifteen townhouses are proposed to be constructed in Montgomery Township. The development was originally conditionally approved by the Board of Supervisors, by Resolution #3, dated October 22, 2007. All conditions of this approval must still be satisfied. The revised plan, dated May 19, 2014, amends the approved plan as follows: Subdivision of the open space area to allow for phased construction of the north and south villages; revised several storm water management details to use HDPE pipe in place of reinforced concrete pipe in certain locations; all units are now proposed to have two garages;

and driveways have been widened to accommodate the larger garages. Mr. Shoupe reported that an additional waiver has been requested for the use of Belgian block curbing along the private roads of the development. The Township staff and consultants have all reviewed the plan for compliance with Township codes. Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera inquired if the Agreements of Sale and other sales related documents will clearly disclose that the property owners will not be permitted to put patios on the back of the homes. Clay Chandler of the Klein Company indicated that they are selling the property to Select Properties and that while they will make this request known to Select Properties, the Klein Company does not have control of the individual lot sale agreement documents. Members of the Board were concerned that this notice would not be given to each potential homeowner of this development and incorporated into the HOA agreements. Resolution #3, made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Michael Fox and adopted unanimously, approved the revised Preliminary/Final Land Development Plan for LDS#630 — Firefox with the condition that all potential sales documentation include the information that patios will not be permitted in this development.

Director of Planning Bruce Shoupe introduced the waiver request by Select Properties for the use of Belgian block curbing for land development plan LDS #639A – Crystal Road and Maple Drive Townhouses. The waiver request for Belgian block curbing is being submitted for approval to provide consistency between the two developments. Resolution #4, made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted unanimously, approved the waiver request for Belgian block curbing for the land development plan LDS #639A – Crystal Road and Maple Drive.

Director of Planning Bruce Shoupe introduced land development plan LDS#672 –

Preliminary/Final Land Development Plan for General Hancock Pad Site #4 – Quaker Steak and Lube Restaurant. Mr. Shoupe reported that the property is located within the General Hancock Partnership development site within the ECPOD zoning district. The applicant proposes to

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subdivide the property into two lots. Lot 2A will include the construction of a 31,157 square foot building planned for a future retail use. Improvements to Lot 2B include the construction of a 6,000 square foot building for a Quaker Steak and Lube restaurant. Resolution #5 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Michael Fox and adopted unanimously, approved the preliminary/final land development plan LDS#672 for the Quaker Steak and Lube Restaurant.

Resolution #6 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Chairman Joseph Walsh and adopted unanimously approved the construction escrow release #3 for Montgomery Preserve Phase 1 in the amount of \$10,907.50.

Director of Planning Bruce Shoupe reported that during the review of the proposed BJ's Wholesale project at Five Points Plaza, PennDOT requested that the right-of-way along Cowpath Road and Bethlehem Pike be dedicated to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The appropriate documents have been created to accomplish this transfer and the transfer will be coordinated through the Township's Traffic Engineer, Traffic Planning and Design. Resolution #7 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconding by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted unanimously, approved the transfer of the area between the legal and ultimate right-of-way along Cowpath Road and Bethlehem Pike for the BJ's Wholesale Project to PennDOT.

Director of Public Works Kevin Costello reported that the Township's contract for the purchase of fuel will be expiring on June 30 and staff have been investigating different Cooperative Purchasing Programs for the best price. After reviewing several options available, including the Montgomery County Consortium of Communities Cooperative Purchase Contract and the Southeastern PA Counties Cooperative Purchasing Board Contract, cost projections made on previous purchases show that the Southeastern PA Counties Cooperative Purchasing Board contract would provide an estimated savings of \$983 for the year. Resolution #8 made by Chairman Joseph Walsh, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted

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unanimously, approved the Township's participation in the Southeastern PA Counties

Cooperative Purchasing Board contract award for the purchase of fuel for a period of two years
beginning on July 1, 2014.

Assistant to the Township Manager Stacy Crandell reported that in March 2011, the Board authorized the submission of an application for a grant under the 2011 Montgomery County Community Development Block Grant Program to be used for the replacement of handicap access curb ramps along roads within Montgomery Township. In December 2011, the Township entered into a grant agreement for this project for \$200,000. Due to some issues with the use of the grant and Township funds on state roads, the Township requested a reduction in the scope of the work to only include Township roadways and specifically Stump Road. The Township has been working with Gilmore and Associates to execute this project and the bid specifications are now ready to be advertised. Resolution #9 made by Supervisor Michael Fox, seconded by Supervisor Candyce Fluehr Chimera and adopted unanimously, authorized the Township Manager to advertise for bids for the Replacement of Handicap Accessible Curb Ramps on Stump Road.

Chairman Joseph Walsh made a motion to approve the payment of bills. Supervisor Michael Fox seconded the motion. The payment of bills was unanimously approved as submitted.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

Electricity rate caps expired at the end of 2010 creating a competitive market environment for electric generation costs. At that time, the Board utilized the Pennsylvania Municipal League's "Municipal Utility Alliance Program (MUA)" and approved a 4 year contract with Constellation NewEnergy (now Constellation Energy Resources). The MUA Program procures electricity rates through a publicly advertised, competitive bid process in which the Township may participate.

At that time, streetlight rate contracts were not available. They later became available and in 2012 the Township began a 3 year contract with Constellation NewEnergy for the electric generation for the Township's street lights.

The two contracts combined have generated a reduction of over \$66,000 in Township energy bills over the term of the contracts. The details of the history of utility expenditures can be seen in the attached charts.

The contracts will expire in the 4th quarter of this year. In preparation for the expiration of the contracts, staff has researched various electric generation companies and brokers to secure new pricing for the Township's electric accounts. Once again, Constellation Energy Resources, through the MUA Program, has resulted in the best option for the Township taking into consideration the bidding process, rate quotes and references.

Staff recommends that the Board enter into a 3 year agreement with Constellation Energy Resources to provide electric generation for the Township electric accounts for the Township Building, Public Works Garage and street lights; all of which are already under contract with Constellation.

ZONING, SUBDIVISION OR LAND DEVELOPMENT IMPACT:

None.

PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION:

In October of 2010 the Board authorized the execution of a 4 year contract with Constellation to supply electric to the Township buildings. In November of 2011 the Board authorized the execution of a 3 year contract with Constellation to supply electric for the Township street lights.

ALTERNATIVES/OPTIONS:

The Board could allow the contracts to expire and the electric would default back to PECO and would fluctuate quarterly with the market. The PECO 'price to compare' as of September 1, 2014 is \$.008/kwh higher than the current quoted rate from Constellation.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Based on the most recent quote on July 10th from Constellation, the Township would save approximately \$20,000 per year across all accounts serviced by Constellation.

RECOMMENDATION:

It should be noted that electric rates are quoted daily and are based on the volatility of the market. Constellation can only hold a quote until 5:00 pm on the day it is provided. As a result, staff is requesting approval to accept a rate quote for a maximum rate of \$.086/kwh for the Township Buildings and a maximum rate of \$.055 for Township street lights, which would represent, in a worst case scenario, a savings of approximately \$10,000 per year and would secure the costs for the next 3 years.

MOTION/RESOLUTION:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors that we hereby authorize the Township to execute a contract with Constellation Energy Resources for electric energy for a three year contract at a maximum rate of up to .086/kwh for the Township building accounts and a maximum rate of .055/kwh for the Township street light accounts.



BACKGROUND:

Chapter 7A of Act 44 of 2009 established standards for municipal pension systems including procedures for selecting the 'most qualified person to enter into a professional services contract' to provide services to the municipal pension plans. These standards include:

- Details required in the advertisement of a Request for Proposal (RFP) for professional services.
- o Details required in the selection criteria of the person/vendor for the services.
- Disclosures required regarding the vendor/person's involvement with the municipality, federal or state lobbying, and a description of responsibilities to the plan(s).

During 2009 and 2010, the Township created and implemented internal procedures to meet the new requirements of Act 44. These procedures provided the basis for the attached policy which needs to be formally adopted by the Board to meet the requirements of Act 44.

The policy is inclusive of all standards required by the Act and has been reviewed by the Township Solicitor.

<u>Procedures for Compliance with the Professional Services Contract</u>

Provisions of Act 44 of 2009

Below are the procedures for the purchase or provision of professional services, including investment, legal, actuarial and other consulting services this municipality has adopted to comply with Act 44:

1) Request for Proposal Application(s) including disclosures:

Applications will be drafted at the time services are needed. The application provisions will address the applicants' qualifications, experience, expertise and compensation to be charged. An Act 44 – compliant Disclosure Form will be included as part of the application. This RFP is not subject to a requirement that the lowest bid be accepted.

2) Advertisement:

The Municipality shall advertise the availability of a Request for Proposal for professional services contract to potential participants or candidates in a timely and efficient manner. An advertisement of such will include the following:

- The services that are the subject of the proposed contract
- Specifications relating to the services
- · Procedures to compete for the contracts
- · Required disclosures and additional information desired

3) Review:

The evaluation process will involve several steps. The initial responses to the Request for Proposal will be evaluated by the municipality. The municipality will determine a list of finalists, interview finalists if applicable and make a final decision.

- The criteria to be used in the evaluation process can differ depending on the professional services requested but all will include:
- The applicant's qualifications, experience, and expertise related to Pennsylvania Municipal Pensions;
- The applicant's approach to managing risk and research capabilities;
- The applicant's knowledge of Act 205 and Act 600;
- The quoted fee(s) associated with the desired service(s) sought;
- The applicants' availability to meet with convened pension committees for periodic review;
- The response of the references provided by the applicant; and
- The ultimate confidence of the municipality as represented by the vote to accept the applicant in contract.

4) Personnel:

Prior to entering into a professional services contract, the contractor shall disclose the names and titles of each individual who will be providing professional services to the municipal pension system,

including advisors or subcontractors of the contractor. Furthermore, disclosures will include all of the following:

- Whether the individual is a current or former official or employee of;
- Whether the individual is a current or former registered Federal or State lobbyist;
- A description of the responsibilities of each individual with regard to the services provisions of the contract;
- The resume of an individual listed in the aforementioned disclosure shall be provided to the municipality upon request.

5) Conflict of Interest:

All Requests for Proposal proceedings shall include a minimum restriction of one year on:

- Participation by a former employee of a contractor or potential contractor in the review of a proposal or negotiation of a contract with that contractor;
- Participation by a former employee of the municipal pension system in the submission of a proposal or the performance of a contract.

Additionally, all Requests for Proposal proceedings shall include a permanent disqualification for:

- Any entity that currently holds a professional services contract, responds to, applies for, or
 otherwise solicits, a professional services contract, that has conveyed a gift having more than a
 nominal value, to any municipal official or employee of this municipality since December 17th,
 2009; or
- Any entity that currently holds a professional services contract, responding to, applies for, or
 otherwise solicits, a professional services contract, that has made a political contribution to any
 parties, candidates or current office holders of or for this municipality since December 17th, 2009.

6) Public Information:

Following the award of a professional services contract, all applications and disclosure forms shall be made public except for proprietary information or other information protected by law.

7) Notification and Posting of Proceedings:

Following the decision by the municipality of a finalist, the relevant factors that resulted in the selection for award of the professional services contract must be summarized in written statement and included or attached to the documents awarding the contract. Within 10 days of the selection for award of the professional services contract, the original application, the RFP summary of proceedings and selection statement and all disclosure forms must be transmitted to all unsuccessful applicants and posted on the municipal pension system's website, if a website is maintained, at least seven days prior to the execution of the professional services contract.

8) Increase:

A professional services contract shall not be amended to increase the cost of the contract by more than 10% or \$10,000, whichever is greater, unless the increase and a written justification for the increase are public and posted on the municipal pension system's website, if a website is maintained, at least seven days prior to the effective date of the amendment.

Proposed Korean War Memorial - Korea Alliance Peace Park

History

(Excerpts from The Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs Guide to Korean War Memorial in Pictures)

The Americans moved quickly immediately following the outbreak of war on June 25, 1950. At an emergency meeting of the UN Security Council on June 26, 1950 the US condemned the North Korean invasion and led the adoption of a resolution urging North Korea to call off the invasion and withdraw. On June 27th, the US drafted a resolution for the UN to participate in the Korean War by providing military assistance to South Korea. The US officials concluded that North Korea's invasion of South Korea must not be permitted and called a meeting of the National Security Council on June 26th, before the UN officially passed the resolution to intervene in the war. The US was already preparing for military response in late June, before the coalition of UN troops was fully organized. On July 1st, the US officially entered the Korean War as Task force Smith landed in Busan.

The Allies had a total of 1,789,000 men participate in the Korean War and the US ground forces accounted for 80% of the UN troops, not counting ROK forces. US Ground forces included three corps (the 1st, 9th and 10th) attached to the Eighth Army command. 8 Army divisions (the 24th, 25th, 2nd, 7th, 3rd, 40th, 45th and 1st Cavalry), 1 Marine division (the 1st Marines), and two combat regiments (5th Infantry Regiment and 187th Airborne Regimental combat Team,) and their support units. Total US Force strength reached some 300,000 at one time during the war.

Personnel from the US Navy Far East command and the 7th Fleet were deployed as amphibious troops. Centering around the 90th and 95th Task Fleet, they conducted operations and supported ground operations when needed. The Navy Air unit supported air operations. The Fifth Air Force and Strategic Air command Headquarters in the US Air Force under the Command of the Far East Air Force bombed North Korea to weaken the North Korean and Chinese ability to fight. They also provided close support to enable UN ground troops to smoothly conduct their operations. The US Air Force dealt heavy blows to the North Korean and Chinese forces throughout the war and was therefore the most feared.

During the War, US forces suffered a total of 137,250 casualties, including 36,940 killed, 92,134 wounded, 3,737 missing in action and 4,439 captured.

The US troops shed blood and tears on the battlefield for three long years, defending Korea, side by side with the ROK soldiers until the armistice was signed on July 27, 1953.

The slogan "We Go Together" was coined by 20 years later to commemorate and recognize the strong alliance and appreciation for the support of the US.

Proposed Concept

A location within the boundaries of Montgomery County Pennsylvania where the US and ROK Korean War Veterans, their families and others can gather to remember and reflect on a time of true bravery and sacrifice.

Memorial Grove in Montgomery Township has been proposed as a possible location. This is a fitting and honorable location as Memorial Grove was first conceived following the tragic events of September 11, 2001 when a local resident and member of the Shade Tree Commission lost his son at the World Trade Center.

As Montgomery Township is home to a number of our veterans and Korean – American's it is fitting to add this additional monument to the already peaceful location of reflection of sacrifice and loss.

Strategic Plan

- Obtain permission and tentative approval from Montgomery Township to go ahead with project planning and fundraising.
- Obtain approval/direction from Montgomery Township for upkeep and specific criteria for monument. i.e. impervious surface space, materials required, etc.
- Creation of Committee for completion of goals.

BACKGROUND:

The Montgomery Township Department of Fire Services (DFS) is requesting approval from the Board of Supervisor's to purchase equipment utilizing grant funds received from the Pennsylvania State Fire Commissioner's Office annual Volunteer Firefighter/ Volunteer Ambulance Service Grant program.

The DFS intends to purchase four (4) portable radios to be used on Montgomery County's new radio system. The equipment is being purchased through the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety Motorola Radio Contract.

ZONING, SUBDIVISION OR LAND DEVELOPMENT IMPACT:

PREVIOUS BOARD ACTION:

On September 23, 2013, the Board of Supervisors approved the submission of a grant application for the purchase of four (4) portable radios to be used on Montgomery County's new radio system. On February 10, 2014, the Board of Supervisors approved the acceptance of the grant funds in the amount of \$13,619.31.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The final cost to purchase the four (4) portable radios is \$14.198.40 based on a quote from the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety Motorola Radio Contract based on their quote dated 6/18/2014. This amount is \$579.09 higher than the original estimate for the grant and this difference will therefore need to be funded using Township funds. Board approval of the purchase is needed as it exceeds \$10,000,

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors grant approval for the DFS to purchase the four (4) portable radios at a cost of \$14,198,40 from the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety Motorola Radio Contract based on their quote dated 6/18/2014.

BACKGROUND:

Municipal Police and the Pennsylvania State Police are statutorily authorized to protect the public primarily through the enforcement of the Crimes Code (Title 18) and Motor Vehicle Code (Title 75) through the use of a variety of law enforcement tools. One valuable law enforcement tool utilized by the Pennsylvania State Police that is statutorily prohibited for use by municipal police is Radar.

Radar utilizes electromagnetic waves to detect the speed of vehicles. At this time the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is the only state in the nation that prohibits municipal police from using Radar. When utilized appropriately, radar is an effective piece of speed-timing equipment, improving the safety of pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists.

Currently several pieces of state legislation (Senate Bill 1340 and House Bill 1272) are in various stages in the Pennsylvania Senate and House of Representatives that would allow the use of Radar by municipal police. Local Municipalities are being encouraged to adopt Resolutions in support of legislation to permit the use of Radar by their Police Departments.

WOULD AUTHORIZE LOCAL POLICE DEPARTMENTS TO UTILIZE RADAR.

WHEREAS, public protection is a principal reason why municipalities are established and exist; and,

WHEREAS, municipal police and the Pennsylvania State Police are statutorily authorized to protect the public primarily through the enforcement of the Crimes Code (Title 18) and Motor Vehicle Code (Title 75); and,

WHEREAS, all of the tools of law enforcement available to the Pennsylvania State Police are also available to municipal police, with one notable exception, that being radar; and

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania is the only state in the United States of America that gives its municipal police a law enforcement mandate and then prohibits them from using a common and effective piece of speed-timing equipment that the Pennsylvania State Police are permitted to use; and,

WHEREAS, the inability of municipal police to use radar has resulted in uneven enforcement of the maximum speed laws across Pennsylvania, as well as contributed to Pennsylvania's distinction as the state with the third highest number of speed-related vehicle fatalities and the second highest percentage of speed-related vehicle fatalities in the country;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of Montgomery Township, Montgomery County, urges the Pennsylvania's General Assembly to enhance the safety of those within our Township by enacting legislation which would authorize the Montgomery Township Police Department to utilize radar.
