




SWAT Officer of the Year





TEEN CORNER

Teen Driving Guide for Parents

It's time for your teen to drive, are you prepared? As a parent, it is important for us to set an example and know the rules of the road. Allow your teen to practice in various situations, during different times of the day and in all weather types. Set a good example and talk to your teen about your expectations and limitations. Research has shown parental involvement and monitoring helps teens make safe choices.

Be Aware of the Eight Danger Zones

Driver Inexperience

Most crashes happen during the first year a teen has his or her license.

Driving with Teen Passengers

Crash risk increases when teens drive with other teens in the car. Limit the number of passengers.

Nighttime Driving

Fatal crashes are more likely to occur at night.

Not Using Seat Belts

Seat belts save lives. Make sure your teen buckles up every ride.

Distracted Driving

Don't allow your teen to partake activities that may take his/her attention away from driving.

Drowsy Driving

Teens are most tired and at risk when driving during the early morning or late at night. Be sure your teen is fully rested.

Reckless Driving

Have your teen avoid unsafe behaviors such as speeding and tailgating.

Impaired Driving

Be a good role model and don't drink and drive. Reinforce this with your teen.

Electronic Cigarettes

Tips for Parents

E-Cigarettes are battery operated devices that deliver nicotine and flavorings to the user in the form of an aerosol.



E-Cigarettes have many different names such as "e-cigs," "e-hookahs," "mods," "vape pens," "vapes," just to name a few.

Most e-cigarettes contain **nicotine**, which is highly addictive and can **harm brain development**. They also contain cancer-causing chemicals and flavoring linked to a serious lung disease.

Before the talk know the facts. Be patient and ready to listen. Set a positive example and be tobacco-free. Answer their questions and keep the conversation going. Share facts and resources with your teenager.

Negative Effects of Social Media for Teens



Ninety-one percent of 16-24 year olds use the internet for social networking. Social media is described as being more addictive than cigarettes and alcohol.

Negative Effects

- ◆ Increased rates of anxiety and depression
- ◆ Linked to poor sleep quality
- ◆ Body image concerns
- ◆ Cyberbullying

What Can Parents Do?

Talk openly to your teen about the negative effects of social media. Advise them of the consequences for posting inappropriate pictures, posts or tweets. Set limits on social media and create ground rules. Urge your child to set privacy settings and to never give out personal information.

School Bus Safety

Tips for Parents, Students and Drivers

The greatest risk to children is not riding a bus, but approaching or leaving one. For drivers, it is essential to understand and follow the Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law. Know your responsibilities as a driver. Every year children are injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses. Caregivers should take an active role in promoting school bus safety with children. In October, Montgomery Township Police participated in Operation Safe Stop. Operation Safe Stop is a proactive way to educate, monitor and enforce school bus safety. On this day, officers monitor numerous school bus stops throughout the township. Everyone plays an important role in keeping our children safe on or around the school bus.

Tips for Drivers

- When backing out of your driveway, watch for children walking to bus stops.
- Be alert. Children who are late getting to the bus stop may dart into the street without looking.
- Slow down! Watch for children walking in the street and playing at the bus stop.
- Learn and obey the school bus safety laws.

Tips for Parents and Students

- Be aware and cross with care! Wait until the school bus and all traffic has stopped before stepping out into the roadway.
- Always walk at least 10 feet in front of the bus.
- When waiting for the bus, stay away from traffic.
- Children should be supervised at the bus stop.
- Never cross the street behind the school bus.
- Get to the bus stop early so you won't have to run across the street.

Police Athletic League

If You See Something, Say Something Campaign

The Department of Homeland Security and its partners raise public awareness of the indicators of terrorism and terrorism-related crime, as well as the importance of reporting suspicious activity, through the “If You See Something, Say Something” campaign. We can all keep our communities safe by paying attention to our surroundings and reporting all suspicious activity to local law enforcement.

What is Suspicious Activity?

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate terrorism or terrorism-related crime.

Reporting Suspicious Activity

To report suspicious activity contact your local law enforcement. Describe what you observed including: who or what you saw, when you saw it, where it occurred, and why it was suspicious.

Detective Division

Montgomery Township Police has a Detective Division made up of four detectives and one detective sergeant. A Montgomery Township Police Detective works to gather evidence and facts for criminal cases. They compile evidence by observing suspects, interviewing witnesses and suspects, and examining physical evidence. Crimes are investigated by the Detective Division using such approaches as search warrants, DNA analysis, crime scene processing, fingerprint analysis, and facial recognition. Detectives receive specialized training to investigate crimes in an ever-changing world to include digital forensics, computer analysis, fraudulent credit cards, and identity theft. The Detective Division is in charge of the processing, labeling, and storage of all property in the department's evidence rooms.

Accreditation Program

In 2001, the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth as a means for the professionalization of law enforcement agencies. The cornerstone of this strategy lies in the 133 professional standards that accredited departments must successfully implement as a part of their policy manuals. Trained assessors conduct an on-site review of department's files, ensuring compliance with all professional standards. The Montgomery Township Police Department is one of only 116 law enforcement agencies in the Commonwealth currently accredited, attaining our original accreditation in December 2004.
